Fire training totaled 46,469 hours during the year. Emergency medical training totaled over 4,075 hours.

In 2012 the department conducted 1 recruit class with 9 new cadets. Each of these recruit firefighters underwent 480 hours of rigorous mental and physical challenges over a 12 week period. All recruits then successfully completed the National Professional Qualifications Firefighter Level 1 and 2 testing process.

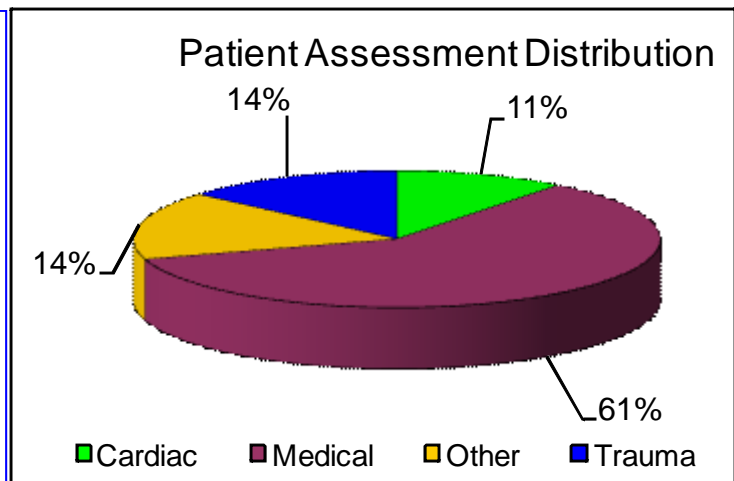

STROKE WARNING SIGNS

If one or more of these signs are present, do not delay:

SUDDEN NUMBNESS OR WEAKNESS - of the face, arm or leg. Especially on one side of the body.

SUDDEN CONFUSION - Trouble speaking or understanding.

SUDDEN TROUBLE SEEING - In one or both eyes.

SUDDEN TROUBLE WALKING - Dizziness or loss of balance or coordination.

SUDDEN SEVERE HEADACHE - With no known cause.

If you experience these signs and symptoms, DIAL 911. Don't Drive yourself to the hospital.

HEART ATTACK WARNING SIGNS

CHEST DISCOMFORT - Most heart attacks involve discomfort in the center of the chest that lasts more than a few minutes, or that goes away and comes back. It can feel like uncomfortable pressure, squeezing, fullness or pain.

DISCOMFORT IN OTHER AREAS OF THE UPPER BODY - Symptoms can include pain or discomfort in one or both arms, the back, neck, jaw or stomach.

SHORTNESS OF BREATH - With or without chest discomfort.

Emergency Management

The Fayette County Emergency Management Agency has been busy in 2012 with the creation and implementation of the Fayette County Faith Based Disaster Network initiative. The Network helps to coordinate volunteer resources in the community, form public-private partnerships and conducts disaster training in a variety of disaster skill sets for members of the faith based community. The Network has grown exponentially to more than 12 churches and more than 100 members in its first year.

During 2012, The National Weather Service issued 54 significant weather advisories for areas including Fayette County. These advisories ranged in severity from High Winds to Tornado Warnings.
