Emergency Management Agency

2018 brought a welcome break to Fayette County from any high-impact events requiring a disaster declaration, state, or federal aid, as had occurred in 2016 or 2017 when the county experienced damages from flooding and Hurricane Irma. The county did experience 90 significant weather alerts of varying types and was included by Governor Deal in one statewide State of Emergency when Hurricane Michael came ashore in the Gulf of Mexico and traveled across Georgia from Florida to the Carolinas. Fortunately, we had minimal impacts from the storm in Fayette County.

Emergency Management staff continued coordinating recovery efforts and reimbursements from the 2015/16 floods and 2017's Hurricane Irma. The Hurricane Irma Public Assistance reimbursement grant was closed out and the county recovered a total of \$116,549.90 out of \$121,218.15 in expenditures. There are two outstanding projects from the flood of 2015/16. Repairs and upgrades should be completed this year and the projects and reimbursements closed out.

Other activities included:

- Participation or evaluation of exercises, including GEMA/HS WinterEX and WebEOC drills, Fayette County Board od Education Reunification drill, Delta Air Lines Fuel Facility Response tabletop exercise, Piedmont Fayette Hospital Active Shooter tabletop exercise, and a tabletop exercise on severe weather response with Summit Endoscopy and District 4 Public Health.
- Assisted with planning and Public Safety operations for the Balloons Over Fayette event.
- Completed two RFP processes and received contract awards for Debris Management and Debris Monitoring contracts.
- Continued the Hazard Mitigation Plan update process.
- Assisted the Town of Tyrone with starting the process of seeking a Hazard Mitigation Grant to repair and upgrade the Pendleton Lake Dam to meet Category I Dam requirements.
- Developed evacuation and shelter-in-place plans for the Stonewall Administrative Complex.
- Coordinated an Emergency Management Assistance Compact request for the Building Safety Department to respond and assist the U.S. Virgin Islands with hurricane recovery activities.



Fire/EMS Training

The Fire/EMS Training Section provides initial and recurrent training across all disciplines within the department. This Section also designs programs for professional development of employees. Training personnel interface with local, State and Federal agencies that govern and monitor Fire and EMS Training to ensure compliance.

The Fire Marshal's Office promotes safety and awareness to reduce the loss of lives and property to the citizens and businesses through public education, life safety inspections, fire investigations, building plan reviews and fire extinguisher training.

These missions are achieved by conducting fire safety education to all 3rd grade students within the unincorporated Fayette County Schools, providing public education to senior citizen organization groups, as well as fire extinguisher training to business owners and to the public within the community. Fire safety inspections are also conducted on all commercial buildings within Fayette County to insure life safety standards are met.



Implemented new program to manage Patient Behavioral Emergency calls, which will benefit patient treatment and facility placements.


Accepted and trained employees on new, updated Self Contained Breathing Apparatus (SCBA) which will improve firefighting capability and fire victim location and rescue.
